

Shabbat and Passover Setup Guide

If you have arranged for us to post you props for Shabbat or Passover, then you will need to set these up yourself in the classroom or classrooms.

1. Select a table to be your Shabbat Table or Passover Table and cover it with the table cover in your extras pack (if included). If not, use a tablecloth if possible, to give the table a feel of being in a dining room. The paper table covers are 1 metre square.
2. Place your candlesticks or LED candles on the table, with the candles turned off at the start of the workshop. There should be instructions for the candles in your confirmation email, or scroll down as these are repeated here.
3. For **Shabbat**, set up your Challah and challah cover. If you have real challah, cover it with the fabric challah cover or the Shabbat napkin (depending on which you received). If you do not have real challah, then you can use the challah poster in place of challah, and again cover it. If you don't have a challah cover, any paper napkin can serve as a substitute.

Put out your kiddush cup, on its saucer. If you ordered a havdallah candle, put this out as well.

Your table should look something like this (with the challah hidden beneath the cover):

When you lift the challah cover from the challahs (or poster of challahs), it will look something like this:

4. Set up your **Passover Seder** plate (if applicable). Note that this includes a few perishable items you will need to provide yourself (such as lettuce and parsley), so read the instructions in advance here:

Shabbat Candlesticks



The larger Shabbat candlesticks are sent along with **electric candles** and a package of **AA batteries**. Two batteries go in each candle, in series (both the same way). The candles turn on when they are tightened. If at first you don't see any light when you tighten, then the batteries need to be put the other way round, but again both the same way. Candles should be **turned off** at the beginning of the workshop so that Rabbi Zvi and the children can 'light' Shabbat candles together. They are easy to turn on and off.

Shabbat Tea Lights (alternative candlesticks)



If you requested these, we will send one glass holder for each light. Set up two candles per classroom. There is a black switch under each tea light. Push quite hard and it will move to turn the candle on.

Candles should be turned off at the beginning of the workshop so that Rabbi Zvi and the children can 'light' Shabbat candles together but it's best to practice turning them on and off beforehand as you do need to push quite hard on the switch.

Note that if we send you more than four tea lights these have to be split between more than one package due to postal regulations, so make sure to look in both packages.
